


## Fly High!






When they were children, Wilbur and Orville never thought that they might fly an airplane.


In 1878, there were no airplanes and no cars. But one day Father gave them a present. The present made them think about flying.




The present was a toy that would fly up high in the air.

Wilbur and Orville drew plans for toys. It was fun to think up ideas. It was fun to plan and build things.




Orville and Wilbur grew up. In their free time, they liked to ride bikes!

When a bike broke, help was close by. The whole town knew that the Wright brothers could fix anything.




Wilbur and Orville opened a shop to fix bikes. Soon after that, they built bikes and sold them.

Then the brothers had an idea for a whole new machine.




Birds and bugs could fly. People could not. But maybe people could fly if they were in a machine.

Could Wilbur and Orville build a flying machine?




A kite that can carry a person is called a glider. The Wright brothers knew about a man who had made gliders. The gliders sometimes crashed because they were hard to steer.




But they tried again. They made a machine to blow wind. They tested all kinds of wing shapes in the wind. Then the brothers made plans for a new glider.

Back at Kitty Hawk, this glider could fly high!




A glider needs wind to fly.

At Kitty Hawk, Wilbur tried the Flyer first. It did not stay up. Then Orville was the pilot. The Flyer lifted off. It flew! The flight lasted 12 whole seconds! The Wright brothers had made the world's first flying machine.
