


Relative Pronouns (who, whose, which, whom)

Why do we use relative pronouns?

To join two sentences and add **extra information** about a person, thing, or animal without starting a new sentence.

They help us lengthen our sentences and make them more interesting.

Relative Pronoun	Used For	Example
who	People	The girl who won the
		race is my friend.
whose	Possession (shows	The boy whose bike
	belonging)	was stolen is sad.
which	Animals or things	The book which I
		borrowed was very
		funny.
whom	People (as an object)	The teacher whom we
		met was very kind.



People

Who → Verb (used for people who do something)

Whose → Noun (shows possession)

Whom → Pronouns / Object (used after prepositions or as the object)

Things or Animals

Which \rightarrow Verb (used for things/animals that do something)

Whose → Noun (shows possession)
