
One sunny day, Fox went for a run.



"Sniff, sniff. My nose is telling me something," said Fox. "What is that smell?"


His nose led him to a house.

Fox jumped once. He jumped twice. He had to have that cheese.



Crow had it in her beak.




Now, this was not funny! Fox just had to have that cheese.

"Crr," said Crow. Her beak was stuffed with cheese. She could not say a word.




"You can really fly," said Fox.




"You are pretty too!" said Fox.

"Crr, crr," said Crow.



The proud crow nodded.




"Too bad you have such a small voice," Fox added.

"Please! Don't feel bad. Queens need to have a big voice, you know. And you just don't have one."




"Crr, crr, crr!" said Crow. Fox started to walk away. Crow could not stand it. She had to show him.

she cried.






And when she did, the cheese dropped out of her beak!
