

FUTURE TENSE

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OBJECTIVES

- Identify forms used to talk about the future.
- Use the future tense to express plans, decisions and predictions.
- Use the future tense in speaking and writing.

WHEN TO USE?

- When we talk about future plans.
- To make predictions about the future.
- To talk about schedules or time tables.
- To make a promise.

HOW TO USE?

POSITIVE STRUCTURE

We use "will" after the subject, the verb is in its base form (V1).

Subject
Pronoun + **will** + **V1**

EXAMPLES:

- She will call you later.
- I will finish that book soon.

HOW TO USE?

NEGATIVE STRUCTURE

We use "won't" after the subject, the verb is in base form (V1).

Subject
Pronoun + **won't** + **V1**

EXAMPLES:

- He won't attend the meeting.
- She won't be here on time.

HOW TO USE?

QUESTION FORM

We use "will" before the subject, the verb is in base form (V1).

**Will + Subject
Pronoun + V1?**

EXAMPLES:

- Will you join us later?
- Will there be life on Mars?

TIME EXPRESSIONS

- I will meet you **tomorrow**.
- She will arrive **next week**.
- They will start the project **soon**.
- We will visit Spain **next year**.
