WRITING | An Opinion Essay

Content and Organisation

1. Introduction

- **Purpose:** Introduce the topic and show your position clearly.
- How to write it:
 - o Paraphrase the essay question using your own words.
 - o State your **opinion or thesis** (what you think about the topic).
- Example:
 - o Topic: "Should students wear school uniforms?"
 - o *Introduction*: "Many schools around the world require students to wear uniforms. In my opinion, this is a good idea because it promotes equality and reduces distractions."

2. Main Body

- **Purpose:** Present and explain your arguments.
- Include **2–3 paragraphs**, each discussing **one main idea**.
- You must include:
 - 1. The **two ideas** given in the question.
 - 2. **One extra idea** of your own.
- Support each idea with **examples**, **reasons**, **or evidence**.
- Example structure for a body paragraph:
 - o Main idea: "Uniforms promote equality."
 - o Supporting detail: "They make students look similar, so no one feels superior because of clothes."
 - o Example: "For instance, in my school, uniforms reduced bullying about appearance."

3. Conclusion

- **Purpose:** Summarise the main ideas and restate your opinion clearly.
- Do not add new information.
- Example:
 - "To sum up, wearing school uniforms helps students focus on learning and creates a fair environment. Therefore, I strongly support school uniforms in all schools."

Style and Register

- Use semi-formal or formal language.
- Avoid slang or contractions (use *do not* instead of *don't*).
- Write in **full sentences** and use **linking words** to connect ideas.

Tips for Success

- Plan your essay before writing.
- Write **4–5 paragraphs** (Introduction 2/3 Body Conclusion).
- Support every idea with a reason or example.
- Use linking words to make your writing flow smoothly.
- Check grammar, spelling, and punctuation.

Active Writing: Topic Sentences and Supporting Sentences

Each paragraph must begin with a topic sentence (main idea) followed by supporting sentences (examples, reasons, or explanations).

Examples:

- 1. Social media is often seen as a key reason people are interacting less face-to-face. Supporting sentences: Many people spend time online instead of meeting in person. This reduces real-life communication and family bonding.
- 2. Working parents are simply too busy to spend time with their family. Supporting sentences: Long working hours leave little time for family dinners or shared activities. This affects the closeness of family relationships.

3. Model Essay

Topic: Some people think that families are not as close as they used to be. Do you agree?

Many people today feel that relationships between members of the same family are not as close as they were a few generations ago. Changes in our working lives and the advent of technology have certainly altered how families interact, but I would argue that families generally remain as close as they ever were.

Increasingly, parents are seeking a greater work-life balance. This means that even in a family where both parents work, they are often able to ensure that at least one parent is available to take their children to after-school activities or to attend school events. A better work-life balance also enables families to spend more quality time together.

It is commonly accepted that the time needed to run a household has also decreased over the last few decades as more and more labour-saving devices have been invented. A striking example of this is the washing machine, which Hans Rosling, a well-known Swedish statistician, called 'the greatest invention of the industrial revolution' because it gave parents more time with their children.

Going online can be seen as a way of bringing families together as well as a distraction. In the past, family members living apart had to write letters and wait a long time for a reply, but nowadays there are many more ways to keep in touch, such as social media and video calls. Overall, I believe that family members do communicate with each other more than in the past, whether through technology or face-to-face.

In conclusion, I would say that while society may have changed, families remain as close as they were, aided by technology and greater flexibility in working patterns.
