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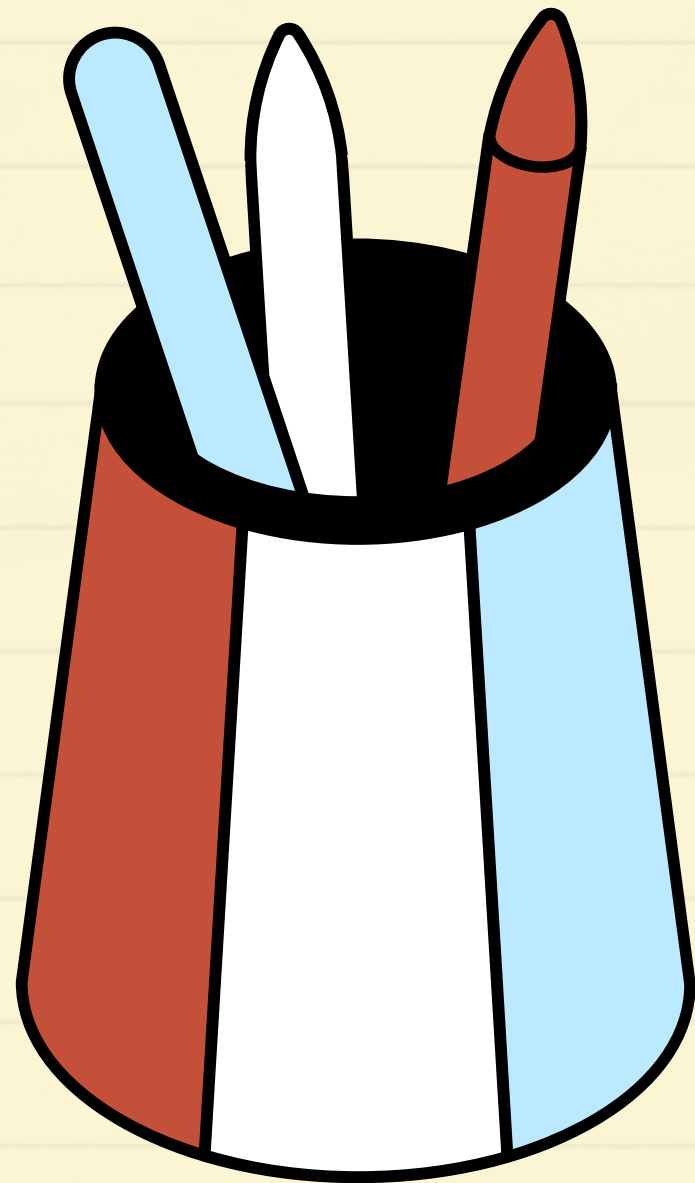

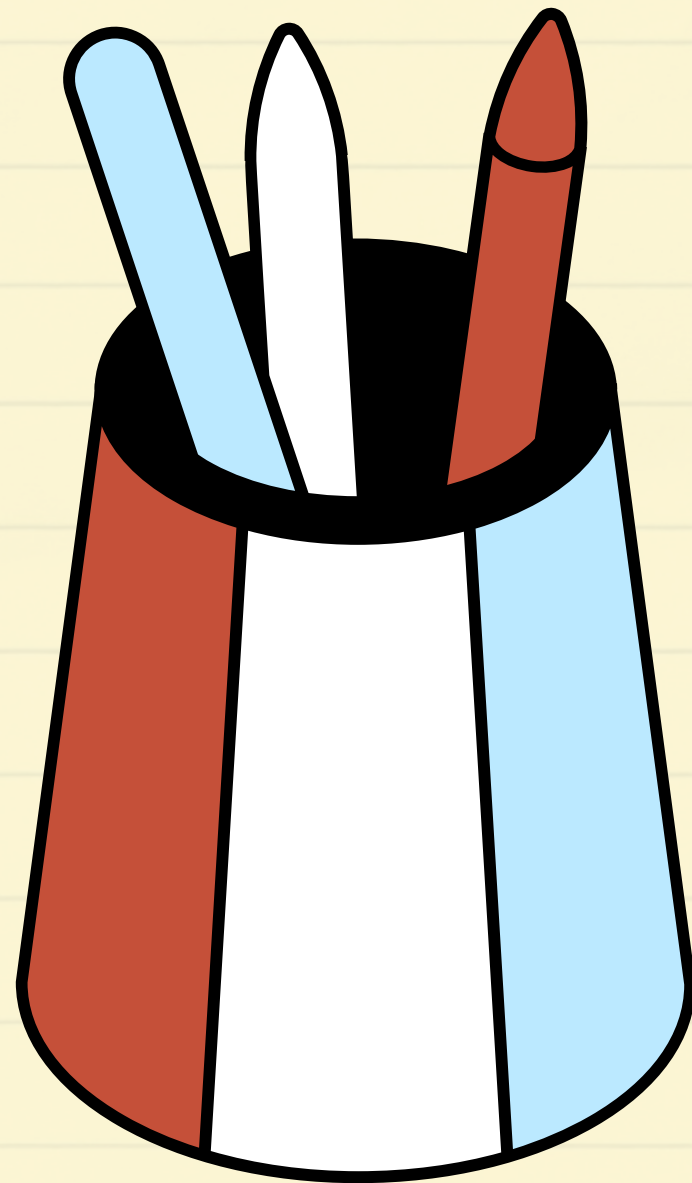

WHAT IS AN APOSTROPHE AND HOW IS IT USED?



An apostrophe (') is a punctuation mark used to show possession and to indicate missing letters in contractions.

POSSESSION



A possession shows that something belongs to someone or something.

POSSESSION FOR SINGULAR NOUNS

To indicate possession for a singular noun, add an apostrophe ('s) at the end of the word.

Example:

Sarah's bag (The bag belongs to Sarah)

The teacher's desk (The desk belongs to the teacher)

POSSESSION FOR SINGULAR NOUNS

More examples:

- The boy's toy (The toy belongs to the boy)
- cat's tail (the tail belongs to the cat)
- My mother's phone (the phone belongs to the mother)

POSSESSION FOR PLURAL NOUNS

***Most plural nouns end in “s.”

To indicate possession, add only an apostrophe (‘) to the end of the word

Example:

The students’ books are here (The books belong to the student)

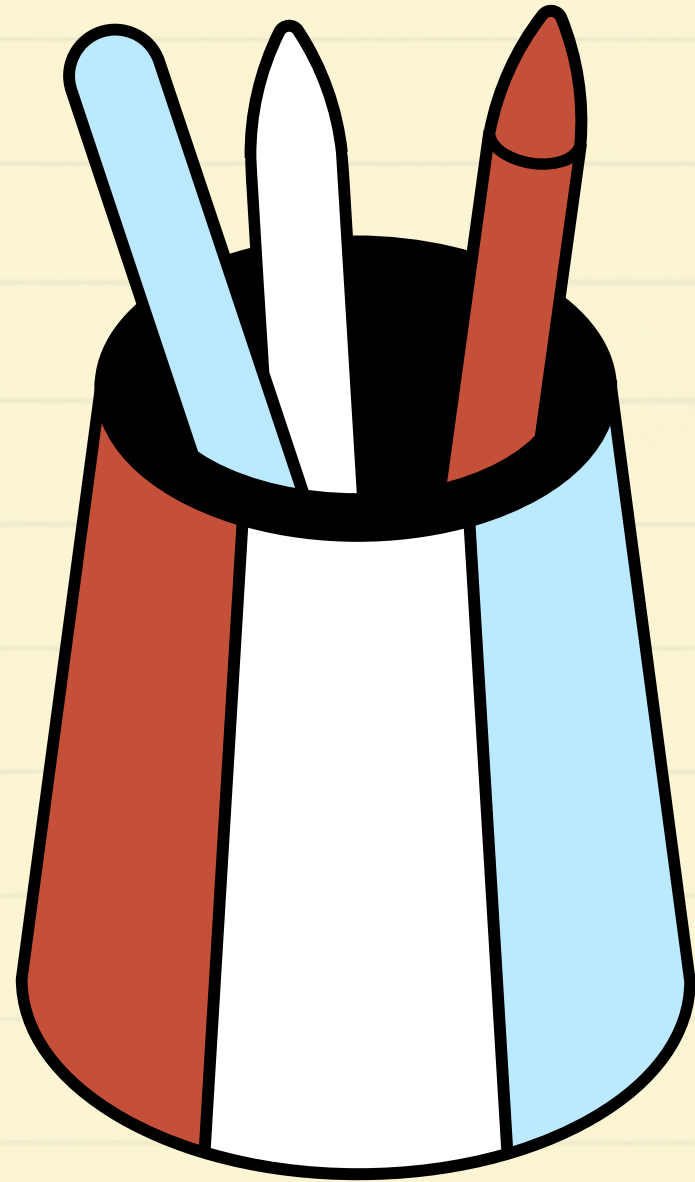
The players’ uniforms (uniforms belong to the players)

POSSESSION FOR PLURAL NOUNS

More examples:

- The farmers' fields (fields belong to the farmers)
- artists' paintings (paintings belong to the artists)
- singers' songs (songs belong to the singers)

CONTRACTIONS



A contraction is a short form of two words.

We use an apostrophe (') to replace the missing letters.

CONTRACTIONS

With **is**

Replace the **i** with **'s**.

Examples:

She is → She's

That is → That's

With **are**

Replace the **a** with **'re**.

Examples:

You are → You're

We are → We're

With **will**

Replace **wi** with **'ll**.

Examples:

I will → I'll

You will → You'll

CONTRACTIONS

With **have**

Replace **ha** with **'ve**.

Examples:

They have → They've

We have → We've

With **not**

Remove the **o** from
not and add **n't**.
(Except "will not")

Examples:

Does not → Doesn't

Cannot → Can't

Will not → Won't










With **would**

Replace **woul** with **'d**

Examples:

He would → He'd

They would → They'd
